

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


Say NO to education

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Attendance Improvement

As the academic year for 2022/2023 moves to a close – we are calling on all our community to support the school with an attendance improvement in the coming school year.

We will be launching a focused effort in September – alongside parents and carers to improve attendance.

Attendance everyday means that no learning is lost – when your child misses a lesson this leaves a gap in the sequence of learning- ensuring good attendance means that no learning is lost. Poor attendance can also affect your child's wellbeing and they miss out on time socialising with friends and building positive relationships. In short – the 'connectivity' of school is simpler and easier if your child is here every day. We hope the grid below helps

Green- 97%- 100%	No risk of learning lost
Yellow- 95%- 96.9%	Risk of underachievement from lost learning
Amber- 93%- 94.9%	Serious Risk of underachievement from lost learning
Pink – 90%- 92.9%	Severe risk of underachievement from lost learning
Red- 0%- 89.9%	Extreme risk – potential court action

We are always happy to work with you to help support issues which may affect your child's attendance. We look forward to improved attendance overall next year.

Sports For the Summer



Forest School

Forest School sessions at John Scurr will start to take place regularly in the Forest School area by the KS1 playground after the summer holiday.

These sessions offer children the opportunity to extend their learning in an outdoor wooded environment through hands-on, practical experiences. Children love exploring the Forest School area and enjoy taking part in outdoor activities such as:

- Mud painting
- Potion making
- Den building
- Digging and planting
- Playing hide and seek games
- Building a bonfire
- Making natural arts and crafts

Forest School sessions offer fantastic opportunities for children to develop skills in a wide range of areas. Below are just some examples of the ways in which Forest School supports learning.

Physical development- Children develop gross motor skills through climbing, building and digging. Children develop fine motor skills using tools to make natural arts and crafts. These are the important skills children need to develop to be able to write. Social and emotional development- Children are encouraged to work as a team and help each other solve problems.

Confidence and self esteem- Adults support children achieve what they have set out to do. Children are encouraged to keep trying, even when something is tricky. Communication skills- Children must work collaboratively and discuss their ideas with friends and adults. Children are exposed to a wide range of vocabulary at Forest School.

Mathematical development- Children must problem solve during Forest School sessions. They frequently have opportunities to count, sort, organise and shape what they find. Scientific development- Children have the opportunity to learn about the natural world around them and carry out their own experiments. Forest School is back!

Pupil Voice Round Up

It has been a fantastic year for the Pupil Voice Committee. All the pupils have worked extremely hard to achieve our goals and have contributed greatly towards ensuring that John Scurr is a happy, healthy and green place.

The Global Climate reps have organised lots of successful events this year, such as Switch Off Week, Walk to School Week and a Litter Pick. Amazing Progress & Outcomes

We are very proud of all our children who have worked hard to achieve amazing results across various assessments and tests this term. This year we have been very busy with our Early Learning Goals in Reception, Phonics Screening in years 1 & 2, Year 2 SATS, Multiplication Check in year 4 and Year 6 SATS.

In Early Years, 67% of children achieved a Good Level of Development. This is in line with national results and above Tower Hamlets average results.

In Key Stage One, we had our phonics screening. 85% of children in year 1 passed this screening. We are very proud of our year two children who passed the retake, bringing our year 2 results up to 93%. Year 2 have also been very busy with the SATS – 55% of children achieved age expected levels or above in Reading, Writing and Maths combined.

In Key Stage Two, we had our first round of Multiplication Tables Check in year 4. We had a mean score of 21.7 out of 25 – higher than national and local figures for 2022. In the Key Stage two SATS, 78% of children achieved age expected levels or above in Reading, Writing and Maths combined.

All our children have worked very hard this year as they continue to develop and learn more. All our children have made excellent progress and we are delighted with their work.

Building, Health & Safety Updates - July 2023

Hello parents and carers!

Since I last updated you, in the autumn of 2022, there has been a huge amount of improvement to the safety and security of our school building.

Our LED light replacement programme has now installed these energy-saving, brighter lights to over 80% of the school building.



We have also strengthened the security of everyone in the building by installing an extra 5 electrically locked doors which can only be unlocked with the use of a key-fob. These have added extra protection for our youngest children in the Nursery classrooms as well as making sure that ALL external non-classroom doors in ALL our playgrounds are protected. These doors will automatically unlock in the event of Fire Alarm activation.

Our CCTV system has been upgraded to ensure that there is improved coverage and quality of image both in the playground areas, the street immediately outside our main and car park gates and in the main office reception area.



The re-surfacing of the Key Stage 1 playground took place over the Easter break making this a smoother, safer and more attractive area to spend time in.

Following the lead of many schools around the country we have installed an internal communication system across the entire school – both inside and outside. This allows us to broadcast safety and information messages to all areas. It can also be used to play music! You may have noticed the outside area of Packham class now has a freshly decorated window frame which looks so much better than the tired and tatty version from before! I also think that the 'grass' area for the children to play in has made a huge difference too.

Our Learning Lodge continues to provide a great new space for parents and staff to meet.

Other planned projects for the remainder of 2023 include:

The repair and refreshing of the outside pupil toilets (including the external brickwork) in the KS2 playground – we are hoping that this will take place over the summer break.

The removal of the overgrown ivy plants on our KS1 perimeter fence. This should have taken place by the time you read this.

Improvements to the heating system – including a full flush and replacement of time-expired control valves- to make all the radiators even hotter for the autumn/winter cold season!

I would like to add my personal best wishes to you all – for the summer break and the remainder of 2023.
